Dyes from flowers, fruits, and leaves of garden plants and wildflowers create unique, mellow colors very unlike the dense colors from commercial dyes. And with natural plant dyes you don't need to use dangerous chemicals.

How to Make and Use Natural Dyes - Gardening Channel

For fruit dyes, simmer your fabric in four cups of water and 1/4 cup salt. If you're using vegetable dyes, simmer in four cups of water and one cup of vinegar. Then boil for one hour. Once you're done boiling, rinse the fabric in cold water.

How to Make Homemade Natural Dyes - Earth Friendly Tips

First, you need to decide what color you want to dye your garment. This may be at your whim, or depending upon what fruits and veggies you have available. Many botanical dyes need a mordant such as alum to bond the color to the fibers. The simplest way to do this is to soak the fibers in a mordant bath before adding them to the colored dye bath. Some dyers will use copper, tin, or chrome as a mordant. However, alum and iron are considered the safest for both the dyer and the environment.

Woad, used to create blue dye, was still very much in use, and was grown quite a lot in Germany in 1290. The roots of the madder were still used to make red dye. To this list of plant-based dye, weld was added, for it was a source for yellow dye. 1321 marked the use of Brazilwood for dye to create coral, red, pink and purple shades.

Make sure the item you want to dye is a white or pale cloth made of a natural fiber like cotton. Any fabric that looks shiny or feels slick like a raincoat is probably a polyester or rayon blend and won't hold dye. First, boil the fabric in a mixture of one part vinegar to four parts water for about an hour.

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Rinse with cold water.
